






Island Stewardship Program

100 YEARS 1923 - 2023

Audubon Texas works with strategic partners to manage 177 islands along the Texas coast.

Coastal Warden Program in Galveston Bay, Matagorda Bay and the Lower Laguna Madre stewarding and patrolling bird nesting islands.







Chester Island, a rookery island in Matagorda Bay

- Maintain and restore existing bird habitats
- Creating new critical breeding habitat for birds

Project Impact:

- Support ecotourism, ecosystem services, and recreational opportunities for 164,833 area residents
- 2.2 million bird watchers in Texas, a major driver in the \$1.8 billion economic impact from Texas wildlife viewing.
- **3,000+ acres of managed habitat** for coastal bird populations on the Texas Mid-coast.
- Habitat for more than 400 bird species. Audubon's 2020 annual waterbird count at Chester Island alone recorded 18 species all nesting on a single 73-acre site.






Two-thirds of North American birds are at increasing risk of extinction (64% or 389 out of 604 North American bird


species)





Vulnerable Birds in Texas

Highly and moderately vulnerable birds may lose more than half of their current range—the geographic area where they live—as they are forced to search for suitable habitat and climate conditions elsewhere.








Working Lands Program



Audubon Conservation Ranching

- Response to grassland bird species decline
- Market-based conservation approach
- Grassland stewardship through a certification label on beef products
- Consumers contribute to grassland conservation efforts by purchasing beef from Audubon-certified farms and ranches
- Enhances demand by consumers that want options for beef that is sustainably raised and benefits wildlife habitat





Water Conservation Program

- Water scarcity and water pollution
- Advance balanced water-management decisions that benefit birds, habitat, and people
- On-the-ground restoration actions
- Market-based mechanisms to provide flexibility in water-management
- International partnerships to address water issues





Texas Water Market Makers Program

- Restoration and conservation of degraded and vulnerable landscapes
- On-the-ground science-based stewardship and engagement
- Pursue and execute water deals to keep water instream
- Leverage Conservation Ranching to create value for landowners and wildlife in Matagorda Bay and in the Pecos River Basin





Bird-Friendly Communities Program

- Addresses urbanization, habitat fragmentation, bird collisions, toxics, invasive species, and domestic predators.
- Strives to provide food, shelter, safe passage, and places for birds to raise their young, through our Plants for Birds and Bird-friendly Buildings programs
- Endeavors for a human-dominated landscape with functioning ecosystems and healthy places

What's good for the birds is good for people too!



Plants for Birds

- Audubon's native plants database by zip code, generates list with tips
- Connects to local chapter or Center with plant sales







Community-focused certification program created to help people protect birds and their habitats where we live, work, and recreate.


Audubon Texas and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department certified first 4 communities in 2020:

Every spring and fall, a third to a quarter of all birds migrating through the US at night, travel through Texas.







Policy Priorities

Achieving bipartisan conservation *solutions* that address the biggest threats to birds and the places they need.

- Conserve and restore coastal habitat squeezed between rising seas and coastal development
- Promote solutions for water conservation and instream flows protections
- Protect and restore grasslands affected by agricultural conversion, in partnership with landowners
- Encourage environmentally responsible energy development and infrastructure projects
- Advocate for equitable climate solutions and nature-based infrastructure
- Support federal, state, and local conservation policies and initiatives
